Rector's Message: *Called Together*

Dear People of Ascension:

Lent has a way of bringing us back to what matters. It quiets the noise, clears away what is secondary, and asks gently but firmly: What is shaping your life? In a culture where almost everything is optional — and where our calendars are already full — Christian faith reminds us that some things are not.

After we profess our faith in the Apostles' Creed at Baptism, the very first promise we make is this: "Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers?" That promise is not about private belief. It is about belonging. It is about gathering.

From the beginning, the followers of Jesus met on the first day of the week. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers. That steady rhythm formed them. It sustained them through fear and uncertainty. It reminded them who they were.

The word we translate as "Church" — *ecclesia* — means "those who are called." The Church is not something we build or organize; it is a people gathered by God. We come together because the Lord calls us. We are summoned.

Rector's Message continued...

Behind that word stands an older biblical image: Israel in the wilderness, assembled as the qahal, the people convoked by God. In the desert, they learned dependence. They learned identity. They discovered they were sustained not by bread alone, but by the Word and the presence of the Lord.

Lent is our wilderness season. And like Israel of old, we discover again that we are sustained not by bread alone, but by the Word and the presence of God. Each Sunday is a kind of wilderness gathering. We step out of our scattered lives and are called together — not because everything is perfect, but because the Lord calls.

We gather even when the sermon feels ordinary, when the music does not especially move us, or when we are tired or distracted. What matters most is not whether every element pleases us. What matters is that we show up as the visible Body of Christ. We may come for many reasons — to see friends, out of habit, to accompany a loved one. Yet beneath those reasons is something deeper: Christ has invited us. “Come and see.” “Take and eat.” “Do this in remembrance of me.”

And something happens when we respond.

At the altar, we hear the familiar words: “The Gifts of God for the People of God.” We take and eat, feeding on Christ in our hearts by faith, with thanksgiving. Sometimes you may also hear another phrase: “The Body of Christ, for the Body of Christ.” That simple sentence captures a profound truth. The One we receive is the One who forms us. The gift placed in our hands is not only nourishment for individuals; it is the forming of a people. The Eucharist is not only something we receive; it is something we become.

St. Augustine once told the newly baptized, “Behold what you are; become what you receive.” Week after week, Christ gathers us, feeds us, and sends us — and gradually, quietly, we begin to resemble the One we receive.

This is why Sunday cannot be just one option among many. It is the heart of Christian life. Here we are forgiven. Here we are strengthened. Here we are reminded that God is at work — in our lives, in our parish, and in the world.

In many churches, Lent brings additional programs — dinners, studies, special gatherings. These can be meaningful and enriching. This year, we have chosen something simpler. Rather than adding more to already busy lives, we are centering on what is essential. Sometimes it is by doing less that we go deeper.

This season invites us to pray — alone or with our families — to read Scripture slowly, to use a devotional at our own pace, and, above all, to let Sunday worship remain the high point of the week. Online worship sustains us when illness or circumstance keeps us away, and we are grateful for that gift. But ours is an incarnational faith. God meets us in flesh and blood. There is something irreplaceable about praying in the same space, singing together, kneeling at the same rail, and exchanging the Peace face to face.

Lent invites us to follow Christ more closely. Perhaps one faithful Lenten practice this year is simply this: answer the summons. Make Sunday worship the priority it was always meant to be — not out of guilt or pressure, but because we belong to the One who calls us.

And week after week, as we gather, Christ forms us into a people renewed, reconciled, and sent for the sake of the world he loves.

Dear people of Ascension, may this Lent draw us back to what matters most. May we answer the Lord's invitation with trust, and may we walk together — gathered, fed, and sent — as the Body of Christ in this place.

A Pastoral Invitation


Dear Siblings in Christ:

Holy Week and Easter: March 29 – April 5

Palm Sunday – March 29

8:00 am & 10:15 am

Holy Week begins with both joy and solemnity. We remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when crowds waved palm branches and cried, "Hosanna!" Yet in the same service, we hear the Passion narrative.

Palm Sunday reminds us that Christian faith is not shallow enthusiasm. The One we welcome as King is the same One who will give his life in love for the world. Praise and sacrifice stand side by side.



The Triduum: The Three Holy Days

The word **Triduum** comes from Latin and simply means “**three days**.” These three sacred days — from the evening of Maundy Thursday through Easter — form the summit of the Church's year. In the biblical understanding of time, a new day begins at sunset. That is why the Triduum begins on Thursday evening. From that moment, we enter one continuous act of worship that unfolds over three days:

- We begin in the Upper Room.
- We move to the cross.
- We wait in the silence of the tomb.
- We rise into resurrection light.

Though celebrated in separate services, the Triduum is truly one great liturgy — one sustained proclamation of Christ's Passion, death, and Resurrection.



Maundy Thursday – April 3 Joint Service with Westminster United Methodist Church – 6:00 pm

On this holy night we gather in the Upper Room. We remember the Last Supper — when Jesus took bread and wine and gave himself to his disciples. On this night he gave us the Holy Eucharist and a new commandment.

The word “Maundy” comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, meaning “commandment.” It refers to Jesus' words:

“A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another as I have loved you.”

But Maundy Thursday is not only about memory. When we celebrate the Eucharist, we are not re-enacting a scene from the past. We are drawn into the same self-giving love of Christ that led him from the table to the cross — and through the cross to the Resurrection.

The Upper Room and Easter morning belong together. The broken bread of Thursday becomes the risen life of Sunday. At the altar, we receive not only the Body given and Blood poured out, but the living Christ who conquers death.

The service concludes in solemn silence as the altar is stripped, symbolizing Jesus' arrest and abandonment. We leave quietly, entering into the gravity of Good Friday.



Good Friday Liturgy – 6:00 pm

Good Friday is the most solemn service of the year. We hear the Passion according to John and offer the ancient Solemn Collects — prayers for the Church and for the whole world.

We venerate the cross not because suffering is good, but because through the cross God reveals the depth of divine love. This is the day we stand at the foot of the cross and behold love poured out completely.

After the silence of the tomb comes the cry of the Church:

Alleluia! Christ is risen!
The Lord is risen indeed!

Easter is the joyful proclamation of Christ's Resurrection — the triumph of life over death and hope over fear.

Both services will be celebrations of the Holy Eucharist filled with music, beauty, and gladness. Easter begins a season of fifty days of rejoicing.

A Final Word

Palm Sunday proclaims the whole story in a single sweeping liturgy — from triumphal entry to crucifixion. But in the Triduum, we slow down and dwell within the mystery. We sit at the table where love kneels to wash feet and gives itself in bread and wine. We stand beneath the cross where that love is poured out completely. We keep watch at the tomb, trusting that even in silence God is at work. And in the dawn light of Easter, we discover what has been true all along: love is stronger than death.

Come and walk these holy days together.

Buildings and Grounds Committee Update

Greetings from the Buildings and Grounds Committee

The Vestry approved a Buildings and Ground budget for 2026 that is somewhat smaller than we had hoped for. We will be cutting back on some services that we provided in past years.

- The floors will not be waxed this year, but will be postponed until 2027.
- Trash will be picked up once a week only. If your organization is having an event and you know there will be extra trash, your organization will have to pay for each extra pickup at \$200 per pickup. Please contact the Buildings and Grounds committee if an extra pickup is needed. Alternatively, you can take the extra trash to the landfill. Also, the lid to the big blue trash bin must be closed completely or the trash company will not do their pickup. Please do not cram extra trash into the bin.
- Currently, Dennis Margroum donates his time to care for our lawn. If he is unable to provide this service, we don't have any funds to hire someone as a backup. Another parishioner would have to donate time for this service. There won't be any weed and feed products applied this year.

Additional News:

On recent Sundays, it has been extremely cold in the Stone Church during the 8:00 a.m. service. On Tuesday, February 10, members of the Buildings and Grounds Committee met with our HVAC contractor to inspect the heating system. It was found to be working properly. The contractor recommended that we set the thermostat to 70 degrees to run continuously day and night to warm the church.

We are conducting an experiment for a few weeks to see if it is more efficient to run the heat at 70 degrees continuously rather than turn it down when we leave at 9:00 am after the service. We will check on the amount of electricity used for the time period and compare it to what we have been using.

We are also considering turning the ceiling fans on a slow speed to distribute the heat.

Please do not change the Stone Church thermostat setting.


